

MARCH UPDATE FOR <u>RETURNING HOPE TO RETURNING</u> <u>CITIZENS</u> PROGRAM

A great last four weeks as we head into Spring and our favorite season as it is the season of rebirth, hope and renewal – all relevant to what we view as the rebirth/second chances we provide to returning citizens.

We were able to assist 171 times during February with the following forms of assistance:

A lot of great success stories this month including that of **Todd Stephens** who we first met last November, and we helped him with basic necessities at that point as he was just one day out of prison.

We quickly assisted him in getting employed and then helped him with a month bus pass to get to/from work along with work clothes, tools/equipment for work and eyeglasses. We recently helped him obtain his own home to rent and assisted him with his move in costs, furniture, home furnishings.

Finally, last week we were able to provide him a great used vehicle to help him get to and from his new (higher paying) job.

He's doing great, we have established a great friendship while Todd has reestablished his relationship with his 14-year-old son. Todd is a wonderful story of success!



<u>Here are some of the other hard working and determined</u> <u>individuals that we helped this past month:</u>

Darius:

Getting the keys to your first apartment or home, brings with it a lot of excitement. For many people, it represents years of struggle, including long periods of homelessness. Darius was released from prison last October and not long after was living in his car, including during these past months of freezing temperatures. Last month he was able to get the keys to his first apartment. We helped with move in costs, furniture and home furnishings and the joy and relief of obtaining those keys is well shown in this photo he sent us:



ALFONZO:

22 long years away and Alfonzo's big sister remains by his side to welcome him home and provide a roof over his head with a bedroom for Alfonzo. He has already completed a course in welding, is now certified and on to a great career. We have assisted in many ways and just yesterday provided the basic, yet important, necessities of new pillows, sheets, blanket, pillowcases and towels and washcloths. Tina and Kristina:

Friends looking out for friends often occurs with returning citizens who will spread the word of what we do to those friends they met in prison and connect them with us. We helped Trina in many ways over the last few months and when her friend Kristina was released last week, Trina connected her with us, and we have begun helping Kristina. They both came to meet us recently and we definitely enjoy seeing these friendships up close and helping those connected with returning citizens we've already helped. A positive pipeline for sure!



DAVID:

Facts are facts. The fact is the biggest problem for returning citizens maintaining employment is transportation. Uber/Lyft are too expensive on a daily basis, busses are late and time consuming with multiple busses often required, family and co-workers are not always reliable etc. So, it's wonderful when we can help someone with a used vehicle. David has a great job at Ford and is doing fantastic except for the ongoing transportation issue which made every day an adventure on how he would get to work. No more though as we provided him a great Buick Rendezvous and that problem has been removed!




JEREL:

The song lyrics go:


- "I'm gonna hit the ground running


ANDRE:

John was away for 10 years and at 58 years of age, many would not share his enthusiasm for living in crowded transitional housing with people half his age and now working 10-hour days, six days a week. But nothing deters his positive attitude, and he was so excited when he got his job and when we provided him assistance with getting basic necessities, he shared photos with us of his accomplishments. With his desire to be successful and his incredibly positive attitude, bright days lie ahead for John!



GREGORY:

It says a lot when your employer (Providence Hospital Novi) likes you so much that when you have transportation problems they offer you Uber rides until your car problem is resolved. Gregory experienced that as he's been a tremendous success as a returning citizen and one of our favorite people to have had the joy of helping him since the moment he came out of prison. We have helped with gift cards, housing, furniture, car insurance etc. His transmission went out on his car, and he desperately needed a solution to getting to work. It was our pleasure to provide him a vehicle. He was incredibly appreciative, and we were very, very happy to help.



DEONO:

In 18 years of prison, one can sit idly or accomplish a lot. Deano chose to accomplish and served as a tutor, worked as a porter, became a talented artist etc. Continuing that desire to achieve, Deono became employed promptly after leaving prison as he secured help from a career coach. We met him yesterday and began our ongoing assistance for Deono and next step will be getting him into his own housing, complete with an area to pursue his paintings given his artistic talent. Many accomplishments for him on the near horizon!
